Privileged to play a part in helping so many great people

Executive Director Gary Roberts reflects on his first 16 months

t somehow seems both like a lifetime ago and just yesterday when I was asked by Tim Cullen to take on the role of executive director in place of the late Mark Shimmin.

The last 16 months have passed in a flash and I have come to feel a real sense of gratitude because I have come to learn just how special this organisation is. It is a privilege to be able to play a part in the development of so many really great people from small countries right across the world.

A year ago, I worked

with Paul Fisher

and Elaine Moretta to select 25 participants for the 2024 annual programme. It was a joy to spend time with the participant and watch as they grew in confidence and skill.

I know that their development is continuing, and I know how they look back at their time in the Isle of Man and at Oxford with a great deal of pride and fondness. One of them, Melintha Fleurmuys from Namibia, has taken time to write about her experience.

My main task in the last year or so has been to negotiate a new funding deal with the Isle of Man government. This has involved considerable effort as, rightly

at a time of constrained budgets, we have been placed under close scrutiny. Those negotiations are coming towards a conclusion and I hope that we will soon be able to announce a new agreement.

Much of those discussions have centred on how we show that the work that we do makes a lasting difference. Can we show that the money spent by the Isle of Man

government brings about real change?

I believe that it does and that we can show that it does, but it is clear that we need to do more each year to demonstrate the lasting value of what we do.

The 2024 group was asked to collaborate in small groups after the programme had ended in order to make progress on individual challenges. From 2025 this ongoing cooperation and monitoring will become even more important.

So, if your individual challenge leads to a change in policy within your organisation, or even nationally, then we want to be able to show this to the Isle of Man government. We can say that their investment is helping to make the world a better place.

The application process for the 2025 programme is now open, so please do whatever you can to make sure that talented people from your organisation are encouraged to apply.

The website https://www.scfmc.im/ has details of our new selection criteria, which shows who is eligible and how we choose participants.
